

Vacancy: Research Assistant (Open Data in Developing Countries)

The Open Data movement promotes the free and open sharing of data for the purpose of reuse, transparency and innovation. In particular, the provision and use of open data is seen as having a positive bearing on the governance of state-run departments and institutions such as universities. There is however a need for more research in order to gain a better understanding of the impact and use of open data, particularly in developing-country contexts. The Open Data in Developing Countries (ODDC) initiative is a project of the World Wide Web Foundation that seeks to address this area of research.

The OpenUCT Initiative is working to advance open practice and digital scholarship at UCT, and is a grant-holder in the ODDC programme. We are looking for a Research Assistant to work with the project team in exploring the use of open data in the governance of and research in South African higher education. The successful candidate will additionally be exposed to and engage in a number of other OpenUCT research and implementation projects designed to promote the curation and profiling of a wide range of scholarly communication outputs.

The candidate will have an opportunity to be part of a unique and exciting institutional initiative undertaking innovative work in this important new area that is gaining increased worldwide focus and attention.

Candidates must be in possession of or in the process of obtaining a postgraduate degree. Good writing skills and some research experience are essential. While technical experience in working with data is not a requirement, any prior expertise in data management, curation or administration will be advantageous. Candidates should be eager to learn and explore new technologies. Previous experience in the higher education arena or with intellectual property and copyright practice would be highly desirable.
